Choosing God's Way Over Weapons

The Linapini Tribe of Tari are notorious for their violence. They recently made the news by killing a policeman. People live in fear of them and no one chooses to visit their territory of their own free will ... except the Adventists.



A large delegation of church members, wanting to bring peace to the hearts of this tribe, attended the WHM's Adventist Community Service Congress held in Tari. Hundreds of them, dressed in their recognisable yellow shirts (photo above), shone the brightness of God's peace into the township. Their presence and message had a positive impact and VIA missionary Dickson Taipe was asked to continue the work with the people of this area.

With much prayer for God's protection and wisdom, Dickson started his ministry with friendship evangelism. He visited people in their homes, gave Bible studies, asked about their needs and prayed with them. As he continued his work, people gradually changed. They laid down their weapons, attended church and some were baptized.

Today, three years later, there are 35 members in this area. With another church under construction. Dickson freely admits that his new converts live in a constant state of uneasy peace. Waves of violence and tribal fighting often tempt them to rearm, sometimes just in self-defence. They find it hard to keep out of the fighting, and some are struggling to maintain their Christianity and choose the way of peace. Dickson requests that we keep his church members in our prayers.

We Will Go!

In Australia and New Zealand, we sometimes forget how easy our travel is. Very often our households have two or three cars. If we need to go somewhere we just grab the keys and walk to our garage. And yet, when our church leaders put out a request for members to drive with them to visit an isolated congregation, most of us find reasons why we can't be there. What if we were asked to walk there?!

The members of minister Eddy Mogory's church, in Morobe Mission in PNG don't have cars, and yet, when he requested his congregation in Hobu to accompany him to visit an isolated group in Mt Sukuza Village, many happily volunteered.

Without Diki there, she watched helplessly as everything they owned was destroyed: clothing, donated evangelism materials, a data projector, a laptop computer and, most tragic of all, a gift of K2000.00 cash which had been given to them to help pay for Diki's fees at Omaura.

VIA Diki Tipi had hoped that his wife could accompany him to Omaura, but due to a lack of accommodation for married students, she had to remain in their work location, alone. As Lydia searched through the ashes of their precious possessions the next morning, she found that their World Changers Bible had only sustained a little scorching to the spine, but their other losses were devastating.

Witchcraft Stones Traded for Rock of Ages



But God always has a plan and Wheatley was shocked to receive very unexpected news from this small town a little while later. The presence of the Adventists had been noticed and appreciated. Hearts had been touched by the Godly way these followers of Jesus behaved in the face of fearful difficulty. Someone offered them a piece of land on which to build a church in this new area, a place where they were requested to run future programs.

Wheatley's own words are a powerful reminder to all of us: "Praise God! He is in control and allows us to face troubles. He is in control of the ways people react to each other. I thank God that He has allowed us to prepare Him a people there, no matter what we have encountered!"

Friendship turns a Critic into a Convert

"You watch out for those SDA people!" Chief William Asia often warned as he addressed the villagers of Lauagu. "You can't trust them."

As a paramount chief, William's warnings were dutifully followed, and his opposition to the Seventh-day Adventist church meant that no welcome had ever been extended to them in his hometown.

Decades passed, and eventually a small Adventist church was established close to his area. The VIA missionary, Dennis Tawa, who was appointed there, heard about Chief William's attitude to all Adventists. In spite of the warnings, he decided to try to befriend him anyway. He visited the chief's home regularly. Gently and with much patience, Dennis built a strong friendship with the elderly chief. They often shared their thoughts on the Bible's teachings.

Dennis could see that his new friend was hungry to learn more about what the Bible really had to say on many topics, and finally the VIA missionary offered to do intensive Bible studies with Chief William. The offer was accepted and as William learned about Bible truth, he had great regret about his previous criticisms of the Seventh-day Adventist Church. He could see that they had only ever taught what the Bible taught.

At the conclusion of the studies, he requested to be baptised at the next opportunity. An opportunity soon came. At the conclusion of an Evangelistic series held in the chief's own home-village of Lauagu, Chief William entered the waters of baptism and became the newest joyful member of the church he had once criticised so strongly.



God Sent an Ambulance

During times of tribal fighting in the deep Western Highlands of PNG, it becomes increasingly dangerous for anyone to travel on the roads. VIA Missionary, Daren Kai, desperately needed to bring his reports into the mission headquarters in Mt Hagen. Being unable to afford transport, his only option was to walk in with the reports, but due to the unrest between warlords in his area, it was impossible for him to go. What could he do?

One day an ambulance arrived in his village and offered him a lift to Mt Hagen. It was a simple offer, but Daren knew it was a gift from God. Ambulances travelled without fear of being attacked on any of the roads the warlords controlled. And so, Daren Kai and his VIA reports made their way to the Mission headquarters by ambulance. God has His ways, and another sponsor now has their report!

Marijuana Cut & Burned

I was doing visitation for one of my church members. He was a fourth-grade student. His parents were not Adventist. His father was a community leader, a warlord and also he was the one who plants marijuana and supplies the Kompiam District.

He told me, "I wanted to change but couldn't for so long. Now salvation has come to my home so I will never squander this precious opportunity". Last quarter's lesson eleven he was baptised along with his second born son. Next year we have nominated him to be the deacon of the company church in which he was baptised.

Faithful in the Face of Tragedy

Mt Bosavi dominates the landscape of the area where VIA missionary, Himson Selegewo works. Some 50,000 people live on the huge Bosavi plain, in the mountain's shadow. Himson is focusing on Haiso village in this area. There are only three SDAs in this town: Himson, his wife and one of their daughters.

This faithful volunteer, who has only been a Seventh-day Adventist for a few years, has experienced a lot of tragedy since his conversion. His youngest daughter died after being bitten by a snake, and a short while later, his little



grandson drowned in a deep ditch. Broken-hearted, he struggled to continue his important work.

His wife's faith wavered as local villagers spread rumours that these tragedies were due to the couple forsaking their former faith. Yet, Himson's faith remained strong, and his strength helped her to remain faithful with him.

Part of the challenge was that along with friendship evangelism and Bible studies, Himson was trying to erect a simple church building. No one in the town would give him any assistance in the construction. Day after day he continued to work on the church alone.

In March this year, as he was fixing sago palm thatch to the roof, a large group of community members arrived and offered to help. He was surprised to later learn that the town had voted to help the lone Adventist finish his work. With many hands to help, the little church was soon completed.

In the nearby village of Mobike, a similar thing happened. VIA missionary, Aaron Henry received support from his community in the completion of the church he was building. How wonderful that the quietly faithful work of these men inspired others around them to



give assistance in finishing God's work in their areas.

The township of Waro has proved to be 'a tough nut to crack' for the Seventh-day Adventist Church. The challenging local environment proved too difficult for a VIA volunteer sent there in 2023. It is recognised as



'belonging to' the Evangelical Church of Papua, and the townspeople seemed reluctant to consider another denominational option.

In 2024 VIA missionary Enox Kalan was appointed to Piti, a town about 60kms from Waro. Waro was part of his designated area, and Enox was determined to reach out to the people. He walked to Waro from Piti as often as he could, endeavouring to make friends.

Enox met a woman, Elsie, who told him that a few non-Waro Adventists would sometimes meet on Sabbaths under a house in Waro with their children. Non-Waro lay people were also trying to reach the town with the Adventist message and somehow no one at the Mission Office was aware of it! Enox was thrilled to hear this news, and prayed all week for the small group, hoping he would be able to locate their unreported house church's gathering place.

Early the next Sabbath morning, dressed in his church clothes, he set off towards Waro. On the outskirts of town, he met a group of young men. He could tell from their red eyes that they were struggling with drug addiction. His white shirt and black tie and pants intrigued them.

One of the boys, Omex, stepped forward and shook Enox's hand. He surprised the VIA missionary by exclaiming, "I know where your Sabbath keepers are." Omex offered to take Enox to see them as they were meeting under his older brother's house!

What a beautiful surprise for the little group of Sabbath keepers when a VIA missionary joined them in worship. They spent a beautiful day worshipping together, discussing how they could build an official church and share with Waro's citizens to the truth of God's Word.

In answer to their hopes and prayers, a piece of land was donated by Waro couple, Joyce and Nato, but they were reluctant to join baptismal Bible studies themselves. Omex, the struggling young man who had first led Enox to meet the Sabbath-keeping group, joined Bible studies and was baptised during the PNG for Christ evangelistic campaign, making him the first official Waro convert. Praise God!

The small group, worked together to build a simple church on the donated land. Most of the church members walk long distances to worship in Waro, and continue to pray they can bring more Waro locals to Jesus and the truth of His Word.

When the group reached the Alice River border crossing, they climbed on board a banana boat to reach the village of Dome. Jacklyn Nomi had brought several bags of donated clothing with her, which were gratefully received by the people of the village.
